When speaking of more than one **person**, we use the term **people**.

1. Types of people

a colleague

- A person or a group of people who work with you.
- Example: I often have lunch with my colleague at the restaurant near the office.

a boss

- The person who leads the company you work for and tells you what to do.
- Example: My boss gave me good feedback for the annual report.

a supervisor

- One of your colleagues who is responsible for telling you your tasks and supervising your work.
- Example: My supervisor is always very helpful.



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a neighbour

- A person who lives next door to you.
- Example: My neighbour is very friendly, we always chat in the corridor.

a flatmate

- A person who shares an apartment with you.
- Example: My flatmate always leaves dirty dishes in the sink.

an acquaintance

- A person who you have met but don't know very well.
- Example: An acquaintance of mine moved to Spain.

a friend

- A person you trust, like and spend time with.
- Example: A friend of mine recommended that film.

a best friend

- A person you trust, share a lot of things with and spend a lot of time with.
- Example: I have known my best friend since I was five years old.

a boyfriend / a girlfriend

- A person you are in a romantic relationship with, spend a lot of time with and may become your life partner or a part of your family at some point.
- Example: My boyfriend bought me flowers on my birthday.

a fiancé/ fiancée

- A person you are planning to marry.
- Example: I introduced my fiancé to my grandparents and they loved him.

2. Describing people's physical appearance

There are many adjectives for describing a person's physical appearance. Here are some common ones:

tall

• Example: Matthew is very tall, you can see him a mile away.

short

• Example: I am very short, I can't reach the top shelf.

thin

- slim, slender, lean, skinny
- Example: Tom is so slim, he is almost too skinny.

fat

- overweight, heavy
- Example: My mother has become overweight in the past few years.

robust

- stout, burly, stocky
- Example: He looks very strong, he has a robust build.

fit

- healthy, athletic, active
- Example: I try to stay fit by eating healthy and exercising.

curvaceous

- a full figure
- Example: That actress is not slim, she is very curvaceous.





Here are some adjectives for describing facial features:

bushy eyebrows

- lots of thick hair on your eyebrows
- Example: Bushy eyebrows are in fashion nowadays.

high cheekbones

- prominent cheekbones
- Example: She looks like a model, she has high cheekbones.

a broad nose

- a wide nose, opposite of a narrow nose
- Example: She has a broad nose but it suits her.

a snub nose

- a small nose that goes up at the end
- Example: He has a snub nose like his mother.

even or regular teeth

- straight teeth
- Example: I am lucky, I have always had regular teeth.

crooked teeth

- teeth that are not straight
- Example: I had crooked teeth as a child, and that's why I had braces in school.

dimples

- when smiling, little hollows that appear in your cheeks
- Example: That baby has such cute dimples when he smiles!

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3. Describing people's personality

Personality refers to an individual's unique tendencies to behave, think and react in a particular way. Most agree that personalities are the results of culture and background as well as individual traits.

calm

- Someone with a calm personality does not show emotions or get agitated easily.
- Example: She is always calm and composed, no matter what happens.
- Related adjectives: serene, tranquil, unagitated

confident

• Someone who has good self-esteem and is sure of him/herself.

arrogant:

- Someone who feels self-important. Someone who thinks too highly of him/herself and thinks their opinions are superior to those of others.
- Example: He was so arrogant that he assumed no one else knew anything about the topic.
- Related adjectives: obnoxious

humble

- Considerate of others, acknowledging of one's limitations.
- Example: He is very successful but he is still humble, that's not common.
- Related adjectives: meek, modest

eccentric:

- Eccentric personalities are different from other people. They are unusual and some people consider them strange.
- Example: My friend is quite eccentric, he wears only red leather all the time.
- Related adjectives: bizarre, quirky

charismatic





- Someone charming, who can easily win other people's attention and affection.
- Example: The lead singer is so charismatic, I can hardly take my eyes off him.
- Related adjectives: magnetic

affectionate

- Someone who is very loving.
- Example: My boyfriend is very affectionate.
- Related adjectives: caring, loving

caring

- Someone who takes care of those close to them.
- Example: She is extremely sweet and caring with her family.
- Related adjectives: affectionate, loving

boring

- Someone who is not very interesting (a negative adjective).
- Example: He was so boring, all he could talk about was his car.
- Related adjectives:

shy

- Someone who is anxious around people, quiet and does not like talking to people he/she doesn't know.
- Example: She is so shy. She avoids situations with a lot of people.
- Related adjectives: Introverted

talkative

- Someone who talks a lot.
- Example: Matt is much more talkative than me, he was talking most of the time.
- Related adjectives: chatty

sympathetic

• Someone who understands and listens to people.

Example: He is always sympathetic to my problems.





• Related adjectives: Empathic, understanding, considerate, kind

anxious

- Someone who worries a lot.
- Example: She is anxious about flying.
- Related adjectives: nervous, worried

bad-tempered

- Someone who gets angry a lot.
- Example: My grandmother was quite bad-tempered, she was always yelling at people.
- Related adjectives: Aggressive, grumpy

clever

- Someone who is very smart.
- Example: He is so smart, he knew what I meant immediately.
- Related adjectives: Smart, intelligent

happy

- Someone who is positive and on a good mood.
- Example: He is always happy, even when there are problems.
- Related adjectives: joyful

extroverted

- Someone who is very outgoing and likes being around people.
- Example: She is extroverted always meeting new people.
- Related adjectives: Sociable, outgoing

introverted

- Someone who is very quiet and shy around people (opposite of extroverted).
- Example: She is very introverted, she barely goes out.
- Related adjectives: shy

reliable

• Someone you can rely on.



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- Example: He is very reliable, I can always trust him to be there for me.
- Related adjectives: Dependable, trustworthy
