1. The use of Future Simple

- We use Future Simple forms will / won't to talk about future predictions – what we predict will happen in the future although we do not have any evidence that this will really happen.
- It is only our opinion of what will happen in the future and it does not necessarily mean it will come true.
- This form is often used with the phrase 'I think' or 'perhaps' in a sentence.

Example:

I think it will snow tomorrow.

- This is our opinion and we do not have any proof for this, so the probability of snow is quite low.

Perhaps he will come.

- Maybe he will, but I am not sure.

2. Formation of Future Simple in affirmative, interrogative, and negative sentences

Type of sentence	Formation of Future Simple	Example
Affirmative sentences	Subject + will + infinitive form of the verb	They will drink wine.
Interrogative sentences	Will + subject + infinitive form of the verb	Will they drink wine?
Negative sentences	Subject + will not (won't) + infinitive form of the verb	They will not drink wine. (or They won't drink wine)

NOTE: In affirmative sentences, we can use the abbreviation 'll instead of will.

Example:

He'll come tomorrow.
